Born in Wichita, Kansas, I subsequently grew up on farms, ranches and small towns from Stillwater, Oklahoma to McPherson,





By the time I was five, my mother and father recognized in me the makings of an artist. They had no background in art, but they saw to it that I received art instruction even though the rural school systems paid little attention to the luxury of such subjects. Having only The Saturday Evening Post to inform him, my dad considered Norman Rockwell the greatest artist that ever lived. On Saturdays he would drive me to the Woolaroc, Philbrook or Gilcrease Museums in the Tulsa area to see their collections. Fascinated by southwestern and First Nations images, I was acquainted with Remington, Russell and Black Bear Bosin long before I knew of Sargent, Ingres, Wyeth or Rothko.

Like most young people entering university art schools, one was considered provincial if they were not painting contemporary and/or





abstract expressionist images. Though I longed to develop my gifts in draftsmanship and painting, I like

I am an Impressionist. Not so much with respect to color and light but more in the vein of the image. Like Degas, I prefer peering through the keyhole rather than posing the figure. I want to capture the snapshot of real life as it happens.

Much like the Pastel Wednesday group.



After that, we turned to social media by creating a Facebook website for just our group. We wanted to be with people we know and trust to continue as much of our normal communications as possible in a safe and fun environment.

Most summers we take a break and spend more time with grandkids and vacations.

Our Summer Art Work 2020

"ANYTHING BUT NORMAL - NO YELLOW"

I'd like to propose a group project for this summer. Something that gives us a different point of view of a familiar symbol of summer. The SUNFLOWER! We have a beautiful bloom in our backyard and Kenny took all kinds of photos of it from different angles, focal points, and compositions. Frankie has selected #10. Was thinking we could all use one of these variations of this single flower. Let me know the image number and I'll send you the "big" file that will be about 8X10, and have enough resolution for enlarging. Or use your own sunflower. **But NO YELLOW.** I'd like to propose that we each select one of the fifteen photos and use **anything but**

YELLOW and our FAV media, techniques and skills.

Crop, Enlarge, Duplicate, Combine, Flip, Cut, Paste

..... And use some of the wonderful techniques we have been sharing over the past five or six years. Watercolor, Masa paper, pour painting, pastel, gouache, acrylic, oil, colored pencil, stitch, quilt, weave, sculpt, negative paint, glaze, eradicate

You can work with the compliments - swap violet for yellow, red for green, and orange for blue. Or just select one color and do monochromatic color scheme ... and vary your dark, medium and light shades.

NO HOLDS BARRED!!!

Except – **no smaller than 8X10".** (Frankie had to make at least ONE rule!!!) This sets the theme for a show that will all work together - No Yellow - Go Green!!! Or some such tag line.










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Choose one of these or use your own.



Attached a one minute time lapse video done while I was painting while anchored out on our boat: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=VvIGtn2KjFQ

(This is cool to watch!)

It's a bit tricky painting on the boat since it doesn't stay still, even when anchored. After several trial runs I have two places to set up my sketchbook

box/easel. Using a chair as my "table" I can look out towards the stern or I can place everything on the cockpit and look to the bow. So far, all steady and stable! And with an

attachment to hold my phone, I can film, too!

My set up for painting on the boat is a simplified version of my typical plein air supplies. I have my trusty sketchbook, and the smallest Heilman pastel box. The sketchbook pastel box, has an area for my pastels and the lid acts as an easel to hold the painting. I cut papers ahead of time, largest being 9x12 (so far). When I first started painting I used small sheets but I find the 5x8 sizes a bit restricting, I prefer making bigger strokes! All items are kept safe in a waterproof pouch. I leave incidentals on the boat, drawing tools, dust catcher, paper towels, tape, clips, small watercolor set and brushes.







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
I first used XL Graphite by Derwent. (see What's Hot below)

I then used some pastel on top for lighter tones.

I go a few times a week to draw and paint with friends at some park or other around Charlotte.

from the beginning of my life through to the end.


This first image is the love between my mother and I. I am that child but I am also the mother.

I hope it will bless you.












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
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(Tony's On My Easel submission prompted me to ask him to do the member spotlight. Thank you, Tony!)


